
Surge of the Spurge By Bryan Welding

Made possible by a generous grant from the Colorado Department of Agriculture (CDA), In 2017 El Paso County initiated a noxious weed mapping and control project entitled; "Happy Parks! Happy People!". The primary focus of this undertaking was to map and apply various control techniques to noxious weed infestations found throughout El Paso County parks, trails, and open spaces. One of the more "sweat-intensive" eradication efforts involved the hand-pulling and bagging of an expansive population of myrtle spurge *Euphorbia myrsinites* alongside a trail in Ute Pass. This is the tale of the encounter:
